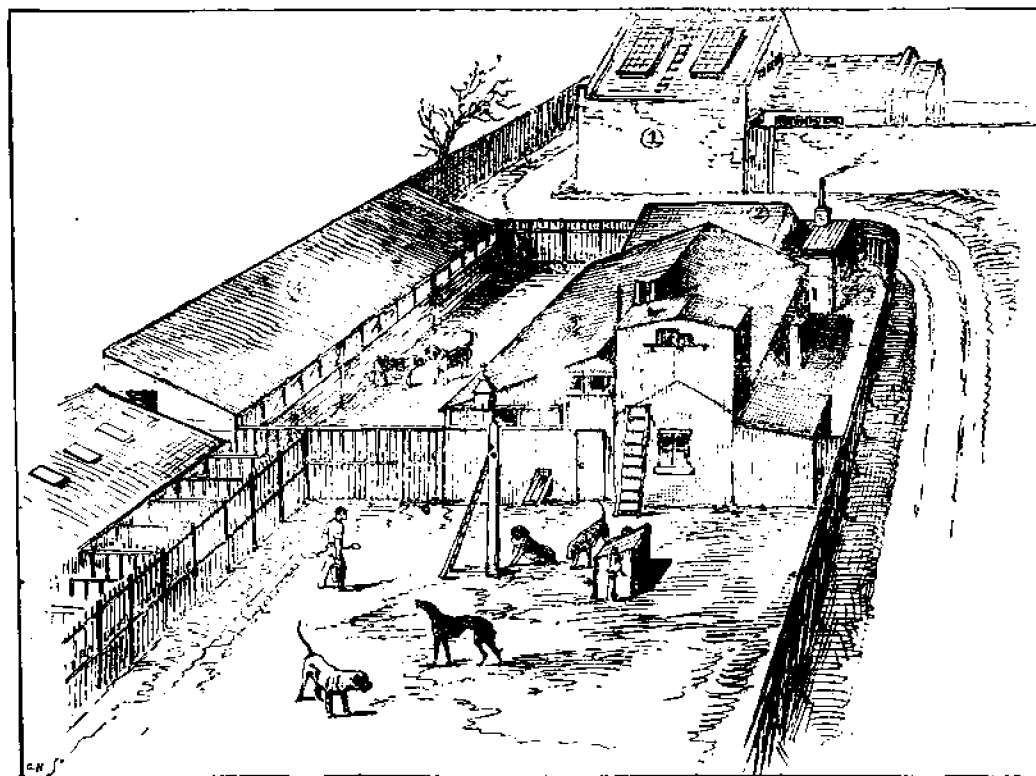
# SPRATT'S PATENT DOG SANATORIUM.

## THE PROGRESS OF VETERINARY SCIENCE AND SPRATT'S SANATORIUM.

(Reprinted from "The Stock-Keeper.")

In the first half of the present century, although eminent veterinaries like Blaine and Youat had written works on the medical-treatment of dogs, the care of man's most constant companion was left to practitioners who either were totally incapable or considered a dog too insignificant a patient to vouchsafe him their serious attention. Many veterinary surgeons thought it actually *infra dig.* to give dogs their professional care, and the majority of those who kept an "Infirmery for Dogs" might, without doing much violence to truth, have designated the wretched hovel set apart for that branch of their business an "*Infernary* for Dogs."



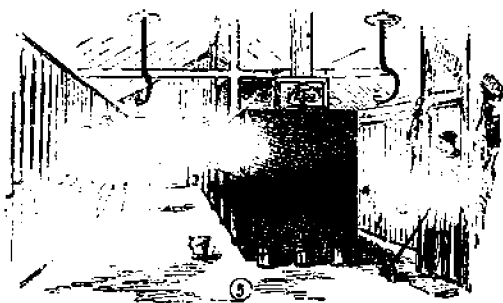
BIRD'S-EYE VIEW OF SPRATT'S SANATORIUM.

The medical treatment of the patients, which was generally left in the hands of one of the grooms, was extremely simple, and reminded one of the skipper who carried no surgeon on board his ship. When anything was the matter with one of

his sailors he would call him aft and let him strip. He then chalked a line round the patient's waist, and if the pain he felt was above the line he gave him an emetic, and if below, a purge.

During the last few years a great change has, however, taken place, and it is gratifying to be able to point to a picture of a more pleasing kind. In different parts of England dog hospitals have sprung up worthy of the name, and some of the veterinary surgeons have made dogs their special study. In the foremost rank amongst these gentlemen is Mr. A. J. Sewell, M.R.C.V.S., who started a canine infirmary six years ago at Larkhall Rise, Clapham, in a most convenient spot, opposite a station which is served by the following railways:—London, Chatham, and Dover, Brighton and South Coast, Great Northern, Midland, and London and North Western. From a comparatively small beginning the establishment has gradually grown until it has become the largest concern of the kind. It was a short time ago acquired by a Company, and is carried on under the title of Spratt's Sanatorium, Mr. Sewell still retaining the veterinary directorship.

Thinking that an illustrated description of the Sanatorium would be of interest to the readers of this journal, we commissioned our artist to make some sketches, and in pursuance of an invitation we accompanied Mr. Sewell on his usual afternoon tour of inspection, dressed in a working costume consisting of a canvas blouse and pantaloons to match. Across the large exercising ground we went to the first range of the kennels, where Mr. Sewell dressed the wound of a St. Bernard, on whom he had operated for cancer. In the adjoining kennel a pill had to be given to a Great Dane. It is astonishing how Mr. Sewell walks into the kennels of dogs he has never seen before, and it is a proof that as a rule it is only dread which induces dogs to bite: this fearlessness inspires his patients with confidence, and makes them tractable. We next visited a long row of kennels (No. 4 in the illustration) which has lately been erected with all the latest improvements. The ventilation is here, as in all the other buildings, efficaciously produced by windows at the top, so that the animals are never

exposed to any draught. In this row of kennels are large dogs, some of them famous champions, standing at stud because their owners home arrangements do not permit the reception of the sultan's elect. Then there are animals being conditioned for show. At the period of our visit it was "washing day" in preparation for the St. Bernard Club Show. Eighteen specimens of this breed had been thoroughly groomed in the morning, and were now stretching their limbs on benches covered with abundance of straw. In front of this wing is another playground, and through a door leading out of it we enter the central building (No. 3), the interior of which is represented in the sketch No. 5. Along two sides are kennels for medium sized dogs, and in the centre there are double tiers of cages for the smaller kinds. Our entry calls forth a lively barking chorus, but the stentorian voice of a kennelman quiets all the inmates with the exception of a Bulldog, who with a beery voice continues to growl from behind the rails, "I can't get at him." In the top row we notice some good Dandies, with those large quaint grey shaggy heads, looking like the produce of the misty clouds which sweep the heather on the moors of their native country,

One of these little fellows, looks intently out of his large eyes (with that appearance of depth of thought which one finds in no other breed) on a countryman of his, a Scottish Collie, who lies stretched out full length in a bottom compartment on the other side. This dog has the supercilious air of "Jeames"; he is now on board wages. His master, who paid a big price for him, is just now travelling. He misses nobody, and nobody misses him in the big house where his lot has been cast to do duty as an expensive ornament on the luxurious hearthrug in the drawing-room. Collies are more often than any other breed chosen for canine furniture of this kind.

Turning down the other side of the middle tier, we come upon several ladies' dogs, Yorkshires, Toy Spaniels, and Pugs, and here we quite expected to hear some whining, and see disconsolate looks, but the little creatures seemed happy enough. Perhaps the reason why they get reconciled to their new surroundings is a motherly-looking woman, who stands opposite the row, at the door of a neat little parlour. This matron is the representative of womanly care in the place. She has been endowed by nature with so extensive a nursing lap that even the fondest mistress of the most pampered pet would not hesitate to leave him under her protection.

There is also a dog with a history here. The story is prosaic, but quite befitting the member of a race which is associated with man in his "ups and downs." Here he sits at the entrance to one of the buildings with a look of indifference. He does not growl, nor does he wag his tail like a dog who has claims in the place like a house-dog would do. That dog had, sooth to say, seen better days; he had known the dissipation of shows and the pride of winning prizes and specials; he had been talked about and quarrelled about, and columns had been written about him in the papers. For some reason, however, he was sent here to take up his temporary residence. He ran into debt, and his master did not redeem him. In time he was allowed to go out when he liked, and he could have stopped away altogether, but, like the well-known prisoner in the Bastille, freedom had become irksome to him, and he never went away.

Although such illegal practices as cropping are naturally not carried on, fashion's foolishness has yet a department in this establishment. In a small room we find a canine hairdresser hard at work, shearing a Poodle carefully to the pattern desired by the dog's master with a clipper that works as close as a razor, having the advantage that the appearance of white hairs which shaving causes is avoided.

We are also taken to the pantry and the boiling-house where the food is prepared. It consists of Spratt's biscuits, stale bread, meat, of which about 1 cwt. a day is used, tripe, sheep's head, and fish. Large quantities of milk are also consumed.

Mr. Sewell has by this time finished his surgical labours, and we go to the distemper house (No. 1). He always leaves it to the last, so as not to have to return from it to the other dogs. This part of the hospital is particularly interesting. The disease is treated on scientific principles, and the care bestowed upon the patients would do honour to any hospital for human beings. A separate staff of servants who never are allowed in the other infirmary is in attendance. On the door of each kennel is a printed form, on which the temperature of the patient, taken with the clinical thermometer, is noted for the inspection of the surgeon, and on which he also writes his directions of treatment. The temperature in this compartment (a most important thing in this disease) is always kept at the same height.

We have now completed the round of the establishment, and pass out again into the land which leads into the main road, leaving Mr. Sewell at his work dressing wounds, taking temperatures, administering medicines, etc. We came away with the conviction that the treatment which the inmates of the Sanatorium receive, and particularly the careful application of all that veterinary science can do to alleviate their ailments, repays a debt of gratitude which the "lord of creation" owes to the most sensitive amongst his animal friends the long neglected dog.

## REGULATIONS.

For the Terrier Show at St. Stephen's Hall,  
 Westminster, April 3, 4, & 5, 1889.

—:—

1. The Show will be held under the Revised Rules of the Kennel Club.
2. **Entries.**—All entries should be made on or before Monday, March 25th, upon Certificates to be issued for that purpose. The Prize Lists and Certificates of Entry can be obtained at 325, Holloway Road, London, N., on application.
3. **Entry Fees.**—The Entrance Fee for each Dog will be 10s.; but Exhibitors can enter two or more Dogs in the SAME CLASS by paying 5s. each for all entries after the first. The Entrance Fees should be forwarded, with Certificates of Entry by March 25th. The Entrance Fee for Dogs not for competition, and Selling Classes is 5s. each. The Entry Fee in Local Classes is 5s., when the same dog is entered in OPEN or Members' Classes, and 10s. where it is not so entered.
4. **Power to Refuse Entries.**—The Committee reserve to themselves the right to refuse any entries that they may think fit to exclude.
5. **Labels.**—Address Labels with instructions for sending Dogs to the Show, will be forwarded to Exhibitors in due course. Should they not arrive Dogs should be sent to the Show, and the Secretary advised.
6. **Arrival of Dogs.**—The Dogs must be at the place of exhibition at Nine o'clock on Wednesday morning, April 3rd, after which hour the Committee will not undertake to receive Dogs. The keepers will receive Dogs on Tuesday, April 2nd. Arrangements have been made with all Railway Companies to deliver the Dogs as they arrive to St. Stephen's Hall; all charges by rail to be defrayed by Exhibitors. The Dogs will be received at the entrance doors by the officials.
7. **Food.**—The Dogs will be fed on Spratt's Patent Dog Cakes, and attended to free of expense to the Exhibitor during the exhibition.
8. **Keepers' Passes.**—Special keepers' passes under special regulations will be provided for *bona fide* keepers only. Exhibitors are requested to apply for these passes when making entries.
9. **Sale of Dogs.**—Exhibitors may state in the Certificates the price at which they are prepared to sell their Dogs, and the Sale must take place if an offer be made to purchase at the price fixed. A commission of 10 per cent. will be charged upon all sales, which must be effected through the Sale Office of the Show. If not for sale, that should be stated. Exhibitors may reduce the price of their dogs upon giving notice to the Secretary, who will furnish them with a card upon which the reduced price will be marked, at a charge of 1s. No other notice will be allowed to be placed over the Dogs. The commission will be charged on the actual price obtained for the Dog, and should it be found that an Exhibitor has sold any of his dogs without the Secretary's knowledge, the Committee shall deduct the commission of 10 per cent., and the exhibitor shall forfeit half the Prize money should the Dog have won a Prize.  
 No sale will take place till one hour after each breed has been judged; and if there are two or more applications by that time for the same Dog, the Committee shall at their discretion either have such Dog or Dogs sold by Auction or by tender, and any surplus thereon shall be equally divided between the Exhibitor and the Committee.
10. **Power to exclude Dogs.**—The Committee shall be empowered to exclude any dog which is not in a fit state for exhibition, either from disease, vice, or any other cause.

## REGULATIONS (continued).

**11. Judging.**—The judging will take place on Wednesday, April 3rd, and the Exhibition will continue open on each day of the Show from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m., except Friday, when the Show will be closed at 8 p.m. punctually. Exhibitors or their agents can remove their Dogs on presentation of the proper authority as soon as the Show closes. Dogs that are not called for by 9 p.m. on Friday, April 5th, will be forwarded as early as possible.

**12. Power to withhold Prizes.**—The Judges will be empowered and instructed to withhold any Prize or Prizes if the Dogs exhibited do not possess sufficient merit.

**13. Judges' Decisions.**—The decisions of the Judges will in all cases be final, except where misrepresentation or breach of the Rules is discovered. Should the Judge be prevented from fulfilling his engagement, the Committee reserve to themselves the right of appointing other gentlemen to fulfill the duties.

**14. Removing Dogs without leave.**—Any person found untying or removing a Dog from its number during the hours the Exhibition is open, without the permission of the Secretary, will be expelled from the Show.

**15. Removing Dogs at Night.**—Exhibitors will be permitted to take home their Dogs every evening after the Show is closed on leaving a deposit of £1 each Dog, and producing a receipt for the Entrance Fee. This deposit will be forfeited if the Dog is not returned before 10 o'clock every morning the Show is open; and if the winner of a Prize is taken out and not punctually returned, the Prize will also be forfeited.

**16. Ownership.**—All the Dogs shown must be the property of the Exhibitor in whose name they are entered. Any wilful misrepresentation with regard to the ownership, age, name, pedigree, breeder, or description of a Dog or Dogs, will, on being proved to the satisfaction of the Committee, be followed by the exclusion from all future Exhibitions of the person making such false statement *see* Kennel Club Rules, 1, 2, and 3.

**17. Safety of Dogs.**—The Committee will be most anxious for the care and safety of the Dogs sent for exhibition, or any other property entrusted to them; but it must be distinctly understood by Exhibitors and all other persons that the Committee will not be responsible for the loss, detention of, or damage to any Dogs or other property, whether arising from accident or other cause whatever, or from any act or omission of themselves, their officers, agents, servants, or others.

**18. Admissions.**—Admission to the Dog Show to Non-Exhibitors:—Wednesday, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., 2s. 6d.; 2 p.m. to 6 p.m., 1s.; 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., 6d. Thursday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., 1s.; 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., 6d. Friday, 10 a.m. to close, 1s. Tickets can be purchased at these prices prior to the Show.

**19. Exhibitors' Free Passes.**—Exhibitors will receive a free pass, not transferable, available on any day of the Exhibition. This pass will be forwarded with the labels for the Dogs; it will admit the Exhibitor to the Exhibition any time the Show is open to the Public (not to the Royal Aquarium). It is not transferable, but a ticket must be obtained for re-admission.

**20. Power to Cancel Classes.**—The Committee reserve to themselves the right to cancel any Class or Classes, should they think fit, and in such case the amount of Entry Fee in that Class will be returned.

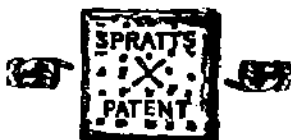

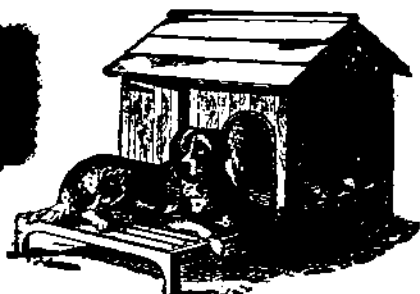

1.—Every dog exhibited at a show under Kennel Club Rules, must, except only those entered in local classes, previous to the time of entry for such show, be entered in a registry of names kept by the Kennel Club at their offices, 6, Cleveland Row, St. James, London, S.W. A charge of one shilling each dog will be made for registration. A name that has been already assumed and duly registered in the Kennel Club Registry, or entered in any published number of the Kennel Club Calendar, or Stud Book, by the owner of a dog of the same breed, cannot be registered except by a distinguishing name or number. If the name of a dog be changed, or an old name be reassumed, such name shall be required to be registered previous to the time of entry.

2.—Dogs that are already entered in any published number of the Kennel Club Calendar and Stud Book are exempt from the above rule, provided their names remain unchanged. Puppies exhibited in classes exclusively for litters of puppies are also exempt.

3.—Any dog which is to be exhibited at a show held under Kennel Club Rules must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor in whose name he is entered, and must have so been 14 clear days before the first day of the show. Each dog must, on the entry form, be clearly identified by name, by date of birth, and by the names of his sire and dam, and of the breeder, each and every of them, if known (as registered in accordance with Rule 1); and if the dam was covered by more than one dog the names of all must be given. If the age, pedigree, or breeder's name be not known, the dog must be entered at each show as breeder, age, or pedigree unknown, any or all, as the case may be.

4.—The bona fide owner of the dam at the time she whelps shall be considered to be the breeder of the litter. In cases, however, where a bitch is lent for breeding purposes, the person to whom the bitch is lent shall be considered the breeder of all puppies born during the period of such loan, provided he or she before the litter is born send to the Secretary of the Kennel Club a statement of the facts, signed by himself or herself and the owner of the bitch.

5.—If the name of a dog which has won a prize has been changed, it is necessary in entering the said dog to give his old name as well as his new name every time he is exhibited until the change has been duly published in the annual number of the Kennel Club Calendar and Stud Book, and if his name be changed again all his names must be repeated for a like period.

6.—If a dog should be entered as before directed by Rules 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, he shall forfeit any prize that may have been awarded him; and if the omission be detected in time, he shall not be allowed to compete, and shall in either case forfeit all entrance fees and subscriptions.

7.—The committee or authorities of any show may reserve to themselves the right of refusing any entries they may think fit to exclude.

8.—A castrated dog, or spayed bitch shall be disqualified from competing, or from receiving a prize if awarded.

9.—Total blindness shall absolutely disqualify; partial blindness shall have great weight against a dog. Should a dog appear to be deaf or lame it shall be in the power of the judge to disqualify, unless he is satisfied that such defects are temporary.

10.—No dog shall be qualified to compete who shall be declared by the duly qualified and appointed veterinary inspector during the show to exhibit any form of contagious or infectious disease, neither shall such dog be entitled, if in that condition, to receive a prize if awarded, unless the committee shall consider that the owner of the dog was not to blame in the matter. The veterinary inspector shall give his decision in writing, duly signed, to the secretary or committee of the show before its close, and such opinion shall be final as regards the condition of the dog.

11.—If any prize-winner is disqualified, the next dog in order of merit as placed by the judge shall take his position, and the win shall count in every respect the same as if it had been the original award. An equal (challenge), or first prize shall be counted as a win to both dogs.

12.—Any person who is proved to the satisfaction of the Committee of the Kennel Club to have been guilty of any fraudulent or discreditable conduct in connection with dogs, dog shows, or field trials, may, in addition to any pecuniary penalty to which he may be liable, be declared incapable of competing for or winning a prize at any show or field trials held under the Kennel Club rules for such period as the committee of the Kennel Club may decide upon.

13.—In estimating the number of prizes a dog has won, with reference to whether it should compete in a (challenge) class or not, the number of prizes won shall be calculated up to 12 p.m. of the day previous to the original day of closing entries for the show.

14.—A dog that has been exhibited or has won a prize in a class exclusively for puppies under twelve months old on the first day of the show is not thereby excluded from being exhibited in a class where previous prize winners are not allowed to compete.

15.—The committee of the Kennel Club shall publish as early as possible in the year in *The Kennel Gazette* a list of shows selected by them as being worthy to rank as first class exhibitions. A first prize at any one of such shows shall for purposes of a challenge class qualification count two points. A first prize at any other show under Kennel Club Rules shall count one point. No dog shall be qualified to compete in a challenge class that has won less than six points at shows registered in or for the Kennel Club Calendar and Stud Books; and no dog shall compete in an open class that is qualified to compete in a challenge class at any show where challenge classes are provided for that breed. The prizes must be won in open classes, which are open to all dogs of any breed without restriction, or in varieties of the same breed divided by weight, colour, sex, or age in adult classes.

16.—No dog shall in future be entitled to be called a champion that has not scored six points in challenge classes, two of which must be either at the Kennel Club Shows or at the shows of the National Dog Show Society, Birmingham. Each win in a challenge class at a first class show (as explained in Rule 15) shall count two points, and each win in a challenge class at other shows under Kennel Club Rules one point.

N.B. to Rules 15 to 16: These Rules shall come into operation upon January 1, 1889, and any dog which shall have qualified previous to that date for competition in a champion class or challenge class must compete in a challenge class where such class is provided. Any dog entitled to be called a champion before that date shall not be deprived of his title.

17.—If any dog be disqualified by the judge, or formally objected to during the show for being improperly tampered with, the veterinary inspector shall examine the dog, and give his opinion to the secretary in writing before the close of the show.

18.—An objection to a dog may be made by any person; it must be made to the secretary of the show at any time within fourteen days from the last day of the show. The objection must be in writing, and the objector must, unless in cases where the objection is laid by the Committee of the Kennel Club, or by the regularly constituted committee of the show (in which case a deposit shall not be necessary), at the same time lodge a sum of £1 in the hands of the secretary, which deposit shall, if the objection is proved to be frivolous to the satisfaction of the committee of the Kennel Club, be forfeited. Such objection must be brought by the secretary before his committee, if possible within fourteen days of the objection being lodged; and any person concerned shall have due notice from the secretary of the show of the meeting, and an opportunity of making any statement which they may desire relevant to the case. The said committee shall decide the case, but under any circumstances an appeal shall lie to the committee of the Kennel Club.

19.—The term "foreign dog" (for exhibition purposes) shall not include any dog for which a separate class is provided in the Kennel Club Register of Names or in the schedule.

20.—In the above rules the word "dog" shall be interpreted to include both sexes.

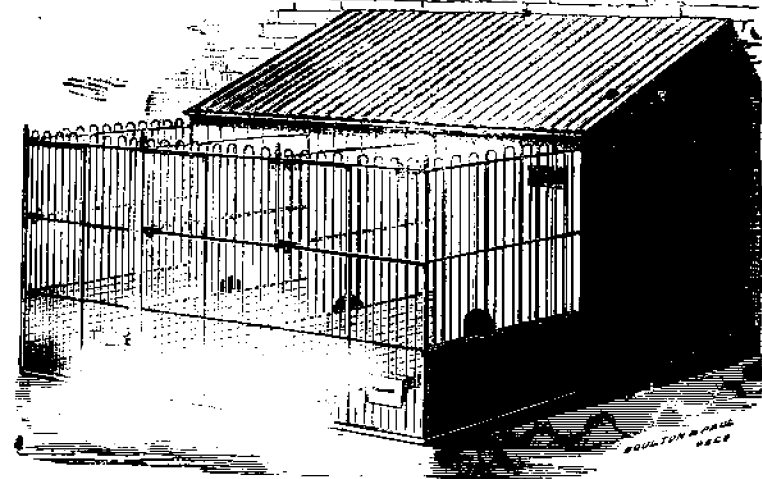

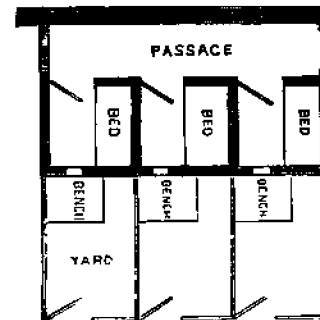
