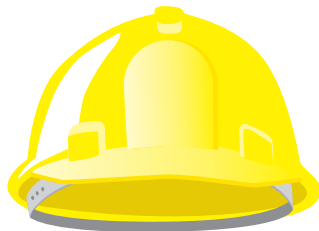
So you are thinking of working with dogs?

WORKING WITH ASSISTANCE DOGS

Skills needed:

- An affinity with, and understanding of dogs
- A good standard of education
- Strong interpersonal and communication skills
- Work/social experience with adults and children from various backgrounds
- Plenty of initiative and the ability to work alone and within a team
- Specialist skills such as sign language and lip speaking may be required
- Full UK driving licence is essential for some posts
- High level of fitness

- Able to use initiative and work alone as well as part of a team
- Those who choose to be self-employed will need business skills

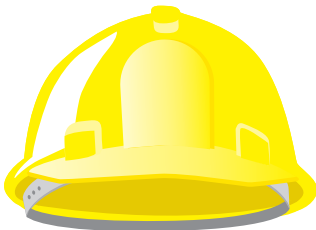

- Must be prepared to work weekends/nights
