## Foreword Luci Gosling, Mary Evans Picture Library

When Shirley Baker took her camera and first roamed around Manchester Dog Show at Belle Vue in 1961, she had an instinctive hunch that this would be a world that would prove fruitful to a photographer looking to capture the quirks and humour of dogs and their owners.

The subject of people and their dogs would be one that Shirley returned to again and again over the years as she built up a body of work that would establish her as one of Britain's finest photographers. Beyond her wonderfully characterful records of the North West dog show scene, canines crop up in many more of her pictures, in candid street scenes from Salford to the south of France.

This is the first exhibition to celebrate Shirley Baker's photographs where dogs feature, either as the support act or in many cases, as the stars of the show. Spanning several decades, her photographs warmly demonstrate that while fashions may change, the bond between pet and owner remains as strong as ever. This is an exhibition for anyone who recognises this bond and who loves good photography; and good dogs.



Introduction Heidi Hudson

This exhibition was over six years in the making... we had always wanted to host an exhibition on Shirley Baker's dog photographs in The Kennel Club Art Gallery. Street photographer, documentarian and journalist – Baker had a long career – 55 years - as a freelance writer and photographer for newspapers, magazines, books and periodicals.

Shirley Baker was observant, reactive and inspired by the 20th-century documentarian greats - Robert Doisneau, Robert Frank, Garry Winogrand, Elliott Erwitt and most notably, Henri Cartier-Bresson. If there was one photographer whom she was most inspired by it may have been the French humanist photographer - Henrie Cartier-Bresson. Cartier-Bresson was known for coining the term, 'the decisive moment' -

'The decisive moment is a concept made popular by the street photographer, photojournalist, and Magnum co-founder Henri Cartier-Bresson. The decisive moment refers to capturing an event that is ephemeral and spontaneous, where the image represents the essence of the event itself.' Baker excelled at capturing the decisive moment and honed her gift at capturing people in the moment. Baker talked in her introduction of one of her early books about how the people in her photographs aren't' posing: 'they're in their situation, they're comfortable in their spaced and they're not offended.' (Shirley Baker)

Capturing moments/people/dogs/history in a brief moment of time – this was Shirley Baker's talent. Her breadth of work has been celebrated both during her time and after her time – mostly her early work street photography of Salford and Manchester when the captured on film the post-industrial slump and reinvention of the North. What is eye-catching to any dog lover is the natural inclusion of man's best friend in many of her street and documentarian photographs.

Baker visited the Manchester Dog Show on several occasions most notably in 1961, 1966 and 1973 capturing the people and their relationships with their dogs in candid spend lour. Sometimes with a hint of humour, Baker captured the 'unusual in the usual', the essence of the environment, the fashions of the day, the breeds, the competition and comradery – much like dog shows today.

At The Kennel Club we celebrate the special relationship between people and their dogs and no doubt Shirley Baker's photographs also celebrate this special relationship.

Baker took thousands of photographs throughout her lifetime and it's possible she would have no idea today how iconic some of these images would become. We celebrate Shirley Baker – an independent woman who made a long career from her art and dedication to her craft. We also celebrate the dogs and the people in her photographs for without them we would not be able to reflect and celebrate the special relationships with our dogs today.

# Shirley Baker 1932 - 2014

Born in Salford and brought up in Manchester, Baker studied Pure Photography at Manchester College of Technology and later took courses at London Regent Street Polytechnic, London College of Printing and the University of Derby. She worked as an industrial photographer, a freelance writer and photographer on various magazines, books and newspapers, and lectured at Salford College of Art and Manchester Polytechnic.

Her images from the late 1960s and early 1970s of the communities of Salford and Manchester were exhibited in Here Yesterday and Gone Tomorrow at the Salford Art Gallery in 1986 and were published as Street photographs (1989). She was later commissioned by The Lowry in Salford to revisit these locations and record both contrasts and continuities. These images were exhibited at the Lowry in 2000 (where she met H.M. Queen Elizabeth II) and published as Streets and Spaces in 2000.

Towards the end of her life, she made various photographic projects for the Documentary Photography Archive, the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital and Viewpoint Gallery and undertaken commissions for Manchester Airport and Cheshire Arts Services. Her work was regularly displayed at the Print Room of the Photographers' Gallery, London.
